This area is away from art, sand, and water type experiences ensuring the books remain safe and dry.</li>   <li>- The organisation of this area respects the materials which are organised in neat and systematic way. For example, similar items are grouped together in the same area and each basket is labelled</li>   <li>- Shadow puppets positioned carefully near a screen and lamp.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Participating in meaningful literacy experiences through signing in, linked to C&amp;L and Literacy</li>   <li>- Signing in allows children to develop a sense of belonging linked to PSE</li>   <li>- Engaging with cultural artifacts (shadow puppets) linked to PSE&amp;C&amp;L</li>   <li>- Exploring sounds in many ways from tactile letters/ gel/ letter pebbles/blocks and writing experiences linked to CLL and L</li>   <li>- Using technology to record and create puppet shows and other possibilities linked to UW &amp; CL&amp;L</li>   <li>- Utilising blank cards to create bookmarks, shadow puppets, name labels, cards, letters and so on, linked to CL&amp;L, Literacy</li>   <li>- Acting out narratives linked to CL&amp;L &amp; EAD</li>   <li>- Developing ideas over time through having a "work in progress" folder linked to PSE &amp; CL&amp;L</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Provide children with the space to try out own ideas and theories</li>   <li>- Build on children's metacognition through talking out loud, " I think I may need to adjust what I..."</li> <li>- I wonder why this happened</li>   <li>- Encourage children to use technology to make their thinking visible</li>   <li>- Encourage children to make their own meaningful symbol systems</li>   <li>- Engage in sustained conversations with children</li> </ul> <p>Listen and respond to children's approximations of words</p>
